# Why We Plan Outages



MESSAGE FROM GENERAL MANAGER AND CEO DEBRA A. COLE

**HAVE YOU EVER RECEIVED** a notification from the folks here at HILCO Electric Cooperative informing you of a planned outage?

You may have wondered, "What is a planned outage?" and "Why does my electric co-op need to schedule an outage?"

Occasionally, the equipment we use to bring power to your home needs to be replaced, repaired or updated. The necessary work often cannot be done without deenergizing the lines and cutting power temporarily. When we need to do such work, as a way to keep our crews and you safe, we plan an interruption to electric service.

We do our best to plan these outages during times when members will be least inconvenienced, so we often perform planned outages during school and business hours. We also try to avoid planning these outages during winter or summer months. We understand that these are the times of the year when you depend most heavily on running your heating and cooling units.

Although slightly inconvenient, a planned outage is actually beneficial to you. Regular system upgrades are necessary for optimal performance, and they increase reliability. Repairing and upgrading our equipment is also critical to maintaining public safety. If older lines need to be replaced, we plan and schedule the work, notify the members who will be affected, then repair or replace the equipment-and that helps keep everyone safe.

Planned outages also allow us to keep you informed of when and how long you will be without power. We can notify you several days before an outage, so you can be prepared. We also keep you aware of when line crews will be working in your area.

Here at HILCO EC, we want to make sure we are doing everything we can to keep you safe and keep our system running smoothly. So the next time you hear about a planned outage, know that it is one of the best ways we can provide you with quality electric service.

We are members, just like you, and elected by you to form your board of directors. Your co-op is managed by educators,


nurses, business owners, fathers and mothers who live near you. We want what you want: affordable electric bills and the comfort of knowing the lights will turn on when you flip the switch.

# Pick the Perfect Place To Plant

**THE RIGHT TREE PLANTED** in the right place can add natural beauty to any landscape, but a tree in the wrong place can become expensive to maintain and even dangerous. Arbor Day presents the perfect opportunity to learn more about the benefits of tree planting and selecting the perfect tree for the right place in your yard.

Arbor Day, first celebrated in Nebraska in 1872, was celebrated April 25 this year in many states, but in Texas, it's celebrated the first Friday in November—this year, November 6. Whichever day Arbor Day is celebrated in your neighborhood, trees are traditionally planted in observance.

When considering tree placement, select a planting location that does not interfere with utility lines either in the air or underground. Tree branches can interfere with overhead power lines, and roots can do the same with underground utilities.

Power outages or interruptions occur when trees and branches come into contact with overhead lines. Electrical arcing and sparking from a wire to a nearby branch can cause a fire.


Tall-growing trees with a mature height of greater than 40 feet should be planted at least 50 feet away from lines to avoid the need for future pruning around electrical infrastructure. A mature height of less than 25 feet is recommended if planting nearer to lines. Keep in mind that trees should never be planted directly under—or closer than 20 feet on either side of—power lines, poles or electrical equipment.

Trees growing near power lines must be pruned to maintain a safe distance from the wires. If you have trees that are growing into power lines, contact your electric provider. Never try to prune them yourself. 134762501

Also, before any tree planting begins, make sure to call 811. The 811 "Call Before You Dig" service is free and locates and marks your public underground utilities so you can avoid buried lines when you dig.

Make sure to call a few workdays in advance of any digging project to give ample time for a professional to locate these utilities. Electrical, gas, water, cable and telephone lines can all be found beneath the ground.

# **Veggie Bake**

- 3 large zucchini
- 3 large yellow squash
- 1 large onion

- 8 ounces fresh mushrooms
- 3 large tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 1 cup balsamic vinaigrette salad dressing
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 3 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- **2.** Slice zucchini, squash, onion and mushrooms, and layer into a 9-by-13-inch baking pan. Slice tomatoes and layer on top.
- **3.** In a small bowl, combine garlic, salad dressing, salt and pepper. Pour over vegetables.
- **4.** Sprinkle Parmesan over all. Cover with foil. Bake 30 minutes, then uncover and bake 15 minutes longer.
